We look forward to his continued support over the coming seasons. Our Head Coach Stuart Law has gone and we've seen Alan Coleman promoted up through the ranks. We wish him well and every success in his new role, reflected we hope, with success in the field, promotion being the ultimate objective. It is our support the Club needs, so we should acknowledge these changes and give them our backing.

It had been a difficult time for Pete as he had to combine two seasons worth of finals because of Covid restrictions. These finals have been the grounding for a number of Middlesex players, Luke Hollman, Toby Roland-Jones among them. The quality of the bowling and stroke play from both the boys and girls was excellent, all credit to the coaches. There were definitely some balls I wouldn't have fancied facing. I am pleased to say that the Seaxe Club has played its part in supporting the Colts and will continue to do so as and when requested. TREASURER'S REPORT

I start my second report as Treasurer, as I did with my first, thanking Peter Jackson for his ongoing assistance, especially his overseeing the not inconsiderable effort of having the trophies and medals engraved and getting them to the awards ceremony in time. (And polishing them!)

Whilst it was a slow start to the year, we managed to fit in an AGM, the aforementioned awards evening, a drinks evening and Christmas lunch. The Seaxe Box reopened for business for the last two LVCC Championship matches and Brian Cahill did his usual sterling job of raising funds through sales of tea, cake and memorabilia.

A draft set of the accounts for 2021 is included in this issue. This is still subject to an independent check but shows that the club has net assets of £22,086 (2020: £25,514) after total expenditure of £12,919 over income of £9,740.

INCOME:

This total income of £9,740 compared with £6,831 in 2020. Members' subscriptions were 5% down and lottery income 15% down which are both due to the lack of face-to-face opportunities to meet early in the season. This is normally when members who pay by cheque are prompted to renew.

As the Chairman has written, we are, like many clubs, trying to move to an online method of renewing both subscriptions and lottery through the forthcoming rebuilt website. I join the Chairman in urging all Members to ensure we have an up-to-date email address for you.

Whilst subscriptions and lottery income were down, we received a number of very generous donations over the year - some expressing a desire for a particular use, some for general use. We are very grateful as these funds allow Seaxe Club to provide the support as already reported by the Chairman.

EXPENDITURE:

Seaxe News: Three issues were produced over the year at a cost of £1,900 compared with £2,057 in 2020. The net reduction is due to sending virtual copies out to Members where possible and the generous support of Middlesex for providing photocopying, stationery and postage for the October mailing. Our request for up-to-date email addresses will help us move towards distributing Seaxe News and other information via email, thereby reducing these overhead costs.

Administration Expenses: £47 (2020: £314) The bulk of the 2020 costs related to non-recurring expense of printing a promotional membership leaflet. Costs in 2021 were therefore significantly reduced.

Social Events: After not being able to meet over 2020, the 2021 costs of £351 covered the drinks at the Player of the Year Awards evening and the Members' social evening at the back end of the season.

Medal and trophy costs: £376 in 2021 covers the costs of the souvenir medals for the awards winners and the engraving of the trophies themselves. The higher figure of £694 in 2020 included the purchase of the new disability award trophy.

Awards: The Club has made provision totalling £1,125 for the cost of the awards for achievements over 2021 that will be awarded in 2022. As it was not possible to arrange the awards ceremony until later in the year, the decision was made to purchase and send out the vouchers for the 2020 season in March so that the recipients could utilise them early in the season.

Middlesex Colts Association (MCA): As was the case in 2020, MCA did not need our help over 2021.

All Stars Cricket and Dynamos: The Chairman has reported on our support for both All Stars Cricket (5 to 8 year-olds) and the new Dynamos (9 to 11 year-olds) programmes. We sponsored 166 places on each programme over 2021 and have already committed to sponsoring another 100 places on each in 2022 with a possible review upwards depending on funds received.

Seaxe Bursaries: The Club invites applications from the Middlesex Cricket Community for assistance. The Chairman has reported that in 2021 we have provided £500 towards Atharva Prasad's trip to India.

SUMMARY: The 2021 deficit of £3,179 arises from the decision to use funds to support the All Stars and Dynamos programmes whilst maintaining a prudent level of reserves for the future. These reserves total £22,086 at the end of December 2021.

As mentioned above, a draft set of accounts has been included with this report. An independent check will take place ahead of the AGM. In recent years, this has been conducted by Michael Wilson but he has decided to hand over to his colleague, and cricket fan, John O'Gorman. We are grateful to Michael for the time he has given to the club and look forward to working with John in the near future.

MIKE O'FARRELL'S REPORT SPRING 2022

So the 2021 season, what did it all mean, on and off the field? Possibly one of the most challenging times at Middlesex that I have ever experienced. Off the field we were confronted by the employer pension contribution issues which I have discussed openly on many occasions. As you will know, thanks to the valiant efforts of David Kendix, our Treasurer we have been able to assess the shortfall and fully compensate all staff, players and former players that were affected.

It was also an amazingly uplifting experience because we came together as a club with everyone supporting one another at what was a critical moment. Such an issue, even though it does represent “future” money, could have had a very negative effect on all involved, but it did not appear that was the case.

On the field we fared badly although better than in 2020. There were some strong individual performances with many players, young and not so young, showing great strength of character, I will leave it to other contributors to focus on the season in more detail but suffice to say that our men and women are showing the resilience and capacity to develop in a manner, that in my opinion, augers well for the future.

Having employed Andrew Cornish to replace Richard Goatley, we also took the opportunity to recruit a Chief Financial Officer, Illa Bhardwaj to bring further focus and stability. These two appointments, together with a revamping of the senior management team, and a realignment of responsibilities, has enabled us to plan for the future in a very positive way, and I am optimistic about our prospects. (for interest, there is an appendix on “who does what” after this note from me).

We all felt as we moved toward the end of the season that we had accomplished much in setting a new direction BUT there was more to come. We decided that it was time to change how we worked with the 1st Eleven and we said good bye to both Stuart Law and Nick Pothas for different reasons and after a brief respite started the search for a new coach; and then came the events at Yorkshire CCC !

I will not repeat all that was said and continues to be said, save that by the time you read this, 1 and 3 other Chairs will have given evidence before the Select Committee of the DCMS and you may have read the 40 sec soundbite out of 1 hr and 30 mins of evidence which was very extensively covered by social media, press and broadcast media .What you may not have seen is the transcript of the evidence released by the DCMS 2 days later which in its 47 pages sets the context .

This was followed by a very positive meeting between the Sports Minister and all 18 First Class County Chairs and the MCC where he recognised how much is being done by the game at many different levels.

So, to the present, we are looking forward to the season with more games at Lord's, a young squad with experience mixed in and, having spoken to them, there is no doubting their commitment. Above all we look forward to success on the field and stability off it.

Finally, my thanks to Seaxe, the club within a club, for its continued support through difficult times and a personal thanks from me to those who sent those messages of support.

ORGANISATIONAL CHANGES

Dear Colleagues, at the end of a challenging period both on and off the pitch for our Club, we are now hopefully moving in the right direction and planning for a stronger and brighter future together as one Club, one team and 'Winning Together'. In order to achieve our goals I am making some organisational changes that should provide clarity and accountability of roles. The main changes are as follows:

Angus Fraser has stepped down from his role as MD of Cricket and he will not be replaced. Angus takes up a new role as Director of Cricket Development which will encompass cricket facilities, player acquisition/retention and contracts, key partner relationships with national counties, Clubs, partners/sponsors and past players. Angus will also continue in his role as a Board member of London Spirit.

Alan Coleman has been appointed into the role of Head of Men's Professional Performance and will lead the strategy for men's elite cricket at the Club. We are currently in the process of recruiting a new Men's First Team Coach and hope to announce this early in January. Both Alan and the First Team Coach will report to me.

Lorraine Poole, currently Head of Events and Operations will become Operations Director, responsible for all Club operations including match day and facilities delivery, cricket operations, events and membership delivery.

Laura Angus, currently Head of Commercial, is appointed Commercial Director responsible for sponsorships and commercial partnerships, marketing and brand, membership strategy.

Steven Fletcher currently Head of Communications and Marketing, is appointed Communications Director responsible for external and internal communications, marketing assets and importantly our strategically important live streams which have grown so significantly and successfully in the past two years.

Simon Shepard who has been working with the men's professional playing group and the Senior Management Team (SMT), on Club culture and 'Winning Together' will now formally join the SMT as Director of Organisational Development, responsible for Club cultural and people development, wellbeing, training and effectiveness.

Katie Berry, Head of Participation, is appointed Director of Participation with the additional responsibilities for EDI club wide and the new MC Foundation combined with her current broad ranging remit over participation, recreation and critically, safeguarding.

As previously announced, Illa Bhardwaj has joined the Club in the new role of Chief Financial Officer. As well as being responsible for all financial matters relating to the Club, Illa will also oversee IT and Board governance matters. James Keightley in his finance role reports directly to Illa.

Hannah Baxter, Business Support Manager, is appointed Executive Assistant to the CEO, providing administrative support to the efficient running of the Lord's office, the Board and SMT.

Danni Warren, Regional Director of Women's Cricket and Kari Carswell, Head of Women's Cricket for Middlesex and MCC, are also members of the SMT and their current roles remain broadly unchanged.

An additional Committee focused on a Cricket Facilities Strategy will be formed and chaired by Board member Sasha White QC. The terms of reference for which will be circulated in due course.

The D & I Committee will be renamed the E, D & I (Equality, Diversity and Inclusion) and will be jointly chaired by Edward Lord OBE and Ankit Shah.

These are exciting times for the Club and I look forward to continuing our journey of Winning Together.

MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE (MEMCOM) 2021

The Middlesex Board has a number of Sub Committees working for it. Membership Committee (MemCom) is one of them. Members of this Committee are the 3 Directors elected by the membership, the Chair and Treasurer of the Club, The Chief Executive, and the Directors of Operations, Communication and Participation. Towards the end of last year it expanded to include a representative of Seaxe Club (Glen Birkwood) and a member of the Members Communication Group (Martin Hadland), to broaden the direct input of members on to the committee

The committee is a place to discuss ideas and set strategy for all issues concerning the members of the club. It provides support and ideas to the leadership teams of the Directors of Operations, Communication and Participation. The main focus is to develop and expand the membership, in diversity as well as numbers, and to provide events that give value for membership.

The committee meets 8 times a year, and also has focus groups and informal meetings /conversations to continue discussions on an ongoing basis.

In 2020, when Covid came and at first no cricket was played, then it was played behind closed doors, the main emphasis was on retaining membership when there was no live cricket to watch, and a package of loyalty benefits for members was brought in.

2021 started with a members focus group, to get feedback on what members felt. This desire to interact with members developed throughout the year to putting out surveys through Fly Research, so that we can ask questions of the membership at different stages of the season. This feedback from members, both as part of a focus group, from ongoing conversations at events, to discussions with members groups, has enabled the Operations team to widen the offer of events and have a direction to aim for to increase member satisfaction.

Bringing representatives of Seaxe Club and Members Communication Group into the Committee has widened the feedback and discussion around how members feel, and what they would like. There are ongoing discussions with MCC on the shop, retail offer, dress code in the Middlesex Room and the amount of Middlesex CCC promotion material that we can have around Lord's, all of which have been brought to the Committee through the Seaxe Club and Members Communication Group.

Another theme that continued throughout the year was getting as many members as possible to have access to matches. Both by being able to attend in person,

but also to develop streaming so members can watch at home. The surveys that have been undertaken for us by Fly Research have clearly shown that members prefer matches to be played at Lord's, so the team have done all they can to maximise the playing time at Lord's, and have been able to produce the survey results as evidence to MCC, in their negotiations.

Work on developing new members, and new membership offers took a back seat whilst the team concentrated on getting the best offer for members available under Covid restrictions. However, these will come to the fore during 2022. A new junior membership was introduced this year, with membership free to under 8's.

Key matters to be developed in 2022 include :

- Increase numbers of membership (including through promotion at non Middlesex cricket matches at Lord's)
- Increase diversity of membership
- Increase membership through the recreational game
- Improve satisfaction
- Expand the offer of events for all categories of membership
- Keep engaging with members
- Develop new ways of engaging with different categories of membership (eg teenagers)
- Work with MCC to strengthen the Middlesex brand at Lord's
- Develop the retail offer more

Membership Committee exists to develop and support the membership. To do this, we need input from the members. Having representatives from Seaxe Club and MCG on the Committee helps to bring members views forward, and the results to the surveys carried out by Fly Research have resulted in a large proposition of the membership putting their views forward.

ALL STARS AND DYNAMO'S 2021

There is a line in Joni Mitchell's 1970's hit Big Yellow Taxi, 'That you don't know what you've got til it's gone'. I hadn't ever really given the line a lot of thought when I heard it on the radio, but looking back at 2020 when Middlesex were only able to offer a very small number of community All Star Cricket centres as we emerged from the first lockdown, I really missed All Stars and Dynamo's cricket. I missed travelling around the county seeing lots of young people running around in the blue All Star shirts and the yellow Dynamo cricket shirts. As it turned out, Joni Mitchell was spot on.

Fast forward to the summer of 2021, we emerged from another lockdown, with a renewed sense of purpose to get young people active, getting a bat and ball into their hands and feel that sense of achievement of hitting the ball as hard as they can and throwing the ball as far as possible. We were very aware that Covid 19 had been very tough on families across the county. Parents were desperate to get their children active in the summer but for some of these families we were also very aware that the pandemic had an effect on their personal circumstances, that any spare money that families would have access to, to pay for 'extracurricular activities' for their children, would be very difficult to find.

The support we received from Seaxe this summer has been unbelievable. With their generous support, we have been able to give young people in Middlesex the following number of free places at our community All Star and Dynamos Cricket centres across the county:

All Stars Cricket - 166

Dynamos Cricket - 166

Working with colleagues in schools, community settings, local authorities, and charities, they helped us to identify the families that they thought needed the support the most. The families face numerous financial challenges daily, these challenges were made worse during the pandemic. Talking to the parents at sessions, they were so grateful that we were able to provide them with free places. One family had 3 children, the mother was so grateful that they could attend for free, as the £120 (£40 per place) was way beyond their means. She was really worried as a few of her children's friends were attending other All Star Cricket centres and they had seen the equipment and t shirts they received and really wanted her children to take part but knew that she would have to disappoint them as she couldn't afford the programme, by being given some free places it allowed her children to look and feel the same as their friends.

Despite the challenges of the weather in May and parts of June, where it tended to rain on the days that we were running All Star and Dynamos centres, the

programme was successful. This summer we ran programmes in the May and August school holidays, which the parents were very appreciative of. The amount of positive feedback we received from them about finding activities for their children to do in the school holidays, as they didn't want to be indoors, to quote one parent 'we have had a 3 month school holiday at the start of the year, I want the kids running around outside having fun!'.

Middlesex cricket really appreciate and value the support provided by Seaxe this year and in previous years. Without your support in 2021 we would not have been able to give 332 free places to young people in Middlesex giving them opportunity to start their cricket journey and growing a love of the game. Coming out of the pandemic, the support was invaluable, but we face challenges every year. We have recently seen the cost of living rise sharply with the increase in energy and food prices; I fear that 2022 will have very similar challenges to 2021. Families will still face the same challenges of wanting their children to take part in a programme but not being able to afford for them to do so. Any support that Seaxe could provide next year would be greatly appreciated and will make a huge difference to the young people and their families across the county.
