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THE COUNTY OF MIDDLESEX

In 1987 the receipt of a letter from 10 Downing Street confirming that the axing of Middlesex County Council (created 1889), did NOT affect in any way the existence of our County of Middlesex (first documented AD704) and began a drive and impetus in promoting the truth about Middlesex.

The County's name had suffered, some unhelpful local authorities (that replaced the County Council), did their best to airbrush out their Middlesex roots. The uninformed media brainwashed those not in the know with what we would now call "fake news" that Middlesex did not exist in ANY form.

The following year 1988, we needed a date for Middlesex Day, and following a poll of members of the predecessor to Middlesex Heritage (Friends of the County of Middlesex), it was decided to connect to the date of the Middlesex Regiment and their heroic stand at the Battle of Albuhera on the 16th May 1811. This date has continued to be a double celebration of the County and its Regiment.

Keep blasting the myth that the abolition of the 76 year old Middlesex County Council was the abolition of the County of Middlesex which is over 13 centuries old, when it was NOT.

Spelthorne borough might be in Surrey County Council but it is NOT in the County of Surrey, Potters Bar and South Mimms may be under Herts County Council but are NOT in the County of Herts. County Councils and Counties are two very different things and one should not be confused with the other.

This is especially important for the fast bowling group, whose programmes are carefully planned with gradual increments of their bowling overs in the lead up to competitive games.

I count myself very lucky that I have been "unfurloughed" to work with Tom Helm, while as it stands the rest of the professional cricket staff remain on the scheme, and are awaiting a date to return to work.

Tom, who is part of the England training group, and I, currently commute to The Oval 3 times a week to complete his training programme. Surrey have done a fantastic job in setting up The Oval as an environment where cricket activity can safely take place, and I know that Angus, Lorraine Poole and the medical team are currently working extremely hard to enable Radlett CC to open up soon as our training base.

To their credit, Surrey have laid on some great facilities that we have been able to benefit from, and we are hugely grateful to Alec Stewart and his team for this opportunity (I bet it's not often those words have been written in the Seaxe News!).

Tom has returned to training in great shape, and really has hit the ground running. He has worked incredibly hard over the last winter after some shoulder issues last season, and has managed to maintain the progress he made in Oman despite not being able to formally train for the last few months.

Hopefully the other members of the squad will be back to join us soon, and we will have some cricket to look forward to. In the meantime, I wish all Seaxe Club members well and I'm sure I speak for everyone when I say that we hope to see you at a game soon.

WHAT HAVE THE ACADEMY BOYS BEEN UP TO IN THE LAST THREE MONTHS

It is very difficult to comprehend that here we are in June and we still haven't seen a ball bowled or a boundary struck. It has been a very challenging few months for the whole country, and one that has required us to adapt to the new norm of online activity. Whilst these few months have been challenging and frustrating for the players, due to them not being able to get outside and practice/play, it has however allowed us to spend more time focusing on other areas. The academy boys have been able to access around four sessions a week, with a mixture of physical and cricket online sessions. The online physical sessions (home gym, yoga, core, mobility sessions) as well as some outdoor independent running sessions where the players see how they fair against each other in a leaderboard challenge. The cricket sessions have covered a wide range of topics with the areas covered being mainly tactical with some examples being different phases of games, field settings, psychological and nutrition. We have also been able to do a number of Q&A with current professional staff players who have kindly volunteered their time to answer the academy players questions. All things considered and within the restrictions of what we have been able to do, it has been an enjoyable challenge and one that the players have still developed even though they couldn't hit or bowl any balls.

IS THERE ANY UPDATE ON RETURN TO PLAY FOR ACADEMY AND YOUTH CRICKET

At this stage there is no date for any youth return to playing, the boys are able to train recreationally at their clubs, but all Academy and County Youth Cricket remains on hold. With things changing by the week and the country adapting to the changes, we are all hopeful that we will see an update which gives us more clarity on a return date. We as a club want to play and to maximise any available time we can once we have been given the green light to do so in line with the Government and ECB regulations.

WHAT WILL THE SELECTIONS FOR THE ACADEMY AND YOUTH CRICKETERS LOOK LIKE IF VERY LITTLE/NO CRICKET IS PLAYED?

At this point it is difficult to think too far ahead, like I mentioned earlier, the situation is changing weekly and our intention is to maximise whatever time we get. It is only June now, so it is important not to write off the summer just yet, but be ready to take advantage of whatever time we get in order to continue the development of all our young players.

ALL STARS CRICKET & DYNAMOS

Let us have a quick reminder about last year, 2019 was a great year with 3,124 children taking part in All Stars Cricket across Middlesex with 858 of them receiving a free place due to the generosity of Seaxe Club supporters. We managed to raise £30,030 with £5,000 being donated by you, so again thank you for your kind support and making a difference for this young people.

The 2020 season would have seen us move in to our fourth year of All Stars Cricket and the launch of the new programme Dynamos Cricket which is aimed for 9 - 11 year olds and very much focussed around match-play. This was to be the perfect next stage of delivery for all those All Stars Cricket children and also a great introduction to cricket to any new young people who may not have taken part in All Stars Cricket or club cricket before. Targets for 2020 to tie in with ECB's Inspiring Generations strategy was to have 87 All Stars Cricket Centres reaching a target of 3,700 young people with the aim of providing a minimum of 1,200 free places for disadvantaged children. For Dynamos, the target was to introduce 30 new centres reaching a target of 600 young people. This gave us a fund-raising target of £42,000.00. We were pleased to see that by the beginning of March, we had 89 centres signed up for All Stars Cricket and 51 centres for Dynamos, meaning first targets were reached, then tragically the Country went into lockdown and the next stage of fundraising and recruitment came to an abrupt end.

We already know that there are many children living in Middlesex below the poverty line, and now the Children's Commissioner has stated it will be years before we fully understand the human, social and economic consequences of the current Coronavirus crisis, with new and distressing stories of hardship. State and the Charitable sector are stretched in their support to meet basic needs. Campaigners are warning that this pandemic will lead to a rise of those in need.

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When cricket can return safely, we want to be ready to welcome these families and for cricket to play its part in supporting children to become or remain active. Securing funding will be even tougher than before, but we are exploring multiple avenues to ensure that barriers are removed from children and that cricket remains a sport of all young people.

BEHIND THE SCENES

I first started working for Middlesex Cricket in 2001 via a joint project with Capital Kids Cricket (CKC), a cricket charity that provided opportunities for inner city children. My role as a Community Coach was to; increase the number of state schools playing cricket in the Middlesex boroughs of East London, to form new community cricket clubs in those boroughs and to support talented young people to access the Middlesex pathway. I left this role a couple of years later to take up a full time Coordinator role with CKC to lead the charity through a difficult transition period.

Feeling the pull of the Club, I returned to Middlesex to take up a Cricket Development Manager role with the then Middlesex Cricket Board (MCB). In 2012, I was promoted to Director of Development for the MCB and in 2016 transitioned to my current role as Director of Participation & Safeguarding with the Club.

Now that participation and recreational cricket responsibilities are part of an integrated Middlesex Cricket strategy, my role is to work across the club to ensure cricket reaches out and supports as many people as possible in the county of Middlesex, be that as a participant, volunteer or fan. I am fortunate to lead nineteen talented members of the Participation Team who deliver over forty participation programmes that focus on youth development, inclusion & diversity and wellbeing programmes across the 17 London Boroughs of Middlesex, as well as supporting our network of clubs and our invaluable volunteers that make the game safe and vibrant for all.

I truly believe sport can unlock potential and change peoples lives for the better, this is what drives me to break down participation barriers for people to get involved with cricket. Being able to take part in sport should not be a postcode lottery and thanks to the support of the Seaxe members, we have provided opportunities for girls to play localised structured cricket for the past seven years that has now formed into a county wide league, fully incorporated into the Middlesex Junior Cricket League (previously MCA) alongside the boys leagues, but proudly retaining the Seaxe name. You have also recently supported hundreds of disadvantage children to access the national cricket programme All Stars Cricket and help spark a lifelong connection to the game. Working with delivery partners, funders, and supporters to raise awareness of these barriers and delivery solutions is a crucial part of my role.

My biggest challenge remains dispelling the perception that cricket is only for the few, cricket can be a sport for many, even if you don't like playing or watching the game, I have seen first hand how the spirit of the game can be a vehicle for meaningful social change. As we emerge together out of this pandemic, I believe the Middlesex family will reach out to more people across London and the surrounding areas, to help people reconnect with others, achieve their potential and enjoy what our game can offer.

As we look with hope to the day county cricket can return, please do come and say hello to me and the wider Participation Team, particularly our Apprentices – talking to you will help them on their learning journeys, by helping them understand what the club and the game means to you. You will find them around the grounds in their Middlesex kit, delivering activation programmes at home matches via Pinky's Pavilion.

SOCIAL MEDIA AND THE DIGITAL AGE

Recently, the Committee has considered how to increase awareness of Seaxe's assistance to youth cricket and broaden engagement with the club's activities. Experience with other organisations, of a similar size, indicates that Social Media may have a role to play. After all, with 80% of the UK shopping online and 2.5 billion smartphones globally, 'digital' communication cannot be ignored.

To try and quantify those we could potentially connect with, a review was initiated. Indications are that there are (unsurprisingly) a large number and this may not be the best place to start. For example, The Cricket Society one encounters online may not be the same as the UK one with which most are familiar, but an identically named Asian organisation - the overseas dialling code was a 'giveaway'!

During this exercise, it was discovered that the ECB were organising a series of webinars on the use of 'digital media', so unperturbed I signed up. Although not all topics covered were relevant (whether Seaxe require a Digital Strategy remains to be seen), there was a lot of interesting material, giving considerable food for thought. Who would've thought that Dumfries CC, in south west Scotland, are a leader in the field.

Considering Social Media, as everyone knows there is a plethora of platforms – Snapchat, WhatsApp, Twitter, LinkedIn, Instagram: what to choose? Despite some managerial shortcomings, Facebook is a constant, remains popular and is widely used – particularly by those born before 1990! It also gives an opportunity for publicity and sharing news updates, whilst allowing feedback or communication between participants.
